

Acacia pendula (Weeping Myall)

Small tree with rough grey bark. It has a stout trunk that divides into a few main stems that support drooping pendulums of silver-leaved branches. Occurs naturally in dry outback areas. The smooth phyllodes (or leaves) are narrow and taper at both ends. They can be up to 10 cm long and are usually slightly curved. Rather sparse yellow flowers are borne on a slender and short main stalk. The seedpods are distinctively broad and flat, up to 8 cm in length
