A successful Garden Blitz with Kids Bizz



We recently visited Kids Bizz Early Learning Centre to assist the centre with some ideas for how they could bring some new life to their gardens.

As the centre has a strong focus on teaching kids about nature and the environment, we decided to plan a “Garden Blitz” day and to get all the kids involved.

We successfully “blitzed” 2 garden areas and the kids are all very excited about starting their plant diaries, which they will use to record the growth and changes of these plants.



We also taught the children lots of little fun facts about plants and why they are so important to our environment.

Our first mini blitz was with the toddler class and these kids were very keen to get planting!

We planted a range of edible plants including lettuce, tomatoes, strawberries, beans, basil, parsley and mint.

We also planted some native Lomandra grasses, Midyim berries, Twiggy Myrtle bushes, and finally, we planted some beautiful Marigolds to provide a food source for our bees.

The second blitz was with the kindy class (ages 3 to 4) whose garden beds needed a little love and care.

We removed the old dry soil and filled in the beds with fresh nutrient rich soil, ready for our planting.

In this garden we planted a range of native plants including Midyim berries, Lomandra and blue Flax Lilies.



The children also planted some of their favourite herbs and vegetables, including tomatoes, strawberries, chives, mint and bok choy.

Our kindy kids planted 5 new trees at their centre including a Wallum Bottlebrush, Gumbi Gumbi tree, and Plum Myrtle tree and are looking forward to watching them grow.



Messmate Park Bushcare News & Next Meeting

We tackled ochra again using cut and paint method.

It was frustrating to see that some of the plants we cut were previously treated in a similar manner.

These offshoots were growing vigorously in an area where most of the other grasses and groundcovers were very dry and crunchy.

One of the more different plants we found was *Alyxia ruscifolia* or chain fruit. (Shrub to 3m with perfumed white 5 petalled flowers in Winter to Spring. Red fruit to 10mm often in chains of 2-4. Sharply pointed 20mm leaves in whorls of 3 or 4.) * Description from Mangroves to Mountains.

It is disappointing weekend storms failed to produce any rain in the district.

Christmas is coming so our next meeting will be a week earlier on Saturday 14th December 8.30am – 11am.

Go Native Christmas Trees Instead of Plastic!

That time of year is fast approaching and only a few days left until we start putting up our Christmas trees!

Did you know that when you purchase plastic Christmas trees, you could be decking your halls with gas and carbon?

Fake trees lead to the emission of more than double the greenhouse gases of a natural one.

Emissions from plastic trees are generated during manufacturing, transportation and from the materials used including, PVC, steel and in some cases lead.

Plastic stands used to hold up natural Christmas trees also leave an environmental footprint, but it is offset by the carbon soaked up by the trees during their time in the ground. The needles are also non-recyclable.



Natural trees can be recycled through green waste collections while artificial trees usually end up in landfill.

So, this Christmas go the eco-friendly way!

Permaculture Principle 10 – Use & Value Diversity

Diversity is nature's way of building resilience and ensuring that all its creatures have an abundance of what they require to keep them healthy and continue the cycle of life.

Each plant and creature has its place and task in the web of life and if one is missing the system is weaker for it.

This principle really highlights the largest change that has been made by humans in the last 50 years we have moved from a variety of different plants to monocultures.

By doing so we have lost a huge amount of our heirloom seeds & trees, and increased weed and pest burden which has led us to increased spraying of chemicals.

All of this, in turn, has impacted our health as we find our food, air, and water polluted by also sorts of chemicals that interfere with the healthy working of our body's own systems.

Regenerative pasture managers now tell us that a healthy pasture should include at least 80 species of plants.

This not only makes the animals healthier through having access to different plants with a variety of vitamins and minerals but also means that when one type of plant is not available for grazing, there is another.

This is particularly important in times of drought, more and varied plant cover also ensures improved absorption and retention of water.

Even in the world of monocropping, farmers are now planting hedgerows with different plants to attract the insects that prey on other insects that are plaguing crops.

This has yielded some amazing results allowing for less chemical use.

For the home vegetable gardener, interspersing vegetables with plants such as Cosmos, Marigolds and Queen Anne's Lace attracts what people term the 'good bugs' that devour the 'bad bugs'.

Planting strong-smelling or scented plants such as Thai Basil or even Stinking Roger confuses the 'bad bug' who then cannot find your prize cabbage or tomato.

Diversity also ensures that your soil is getting a variety of different vitamins and minerals which in turn feed the plants making them healthy and strong.

Nowhere in nature do we find monocultures, there are always a diverse number of plants, insects, and animals in a landscape that is thriving.

The same principle applies to people and communities.



A person who has more than one income stream finds themselves less at risk when it comes to their livelihood and a community that has people with a diversity of skills also finds themselves in a more resilient position.

The wisdom of diversity is everywhere. It is nature's way of ensuring a stable and life-giving environment.

Nursery Specials

Monthly specials - Were \$2.40 and are now \$2.00 (Tubestock)

Diamond Leafed Pittosporum (*Auranticarpa rhombifolia*)

Also known as White Holly, White Myrtle and Hollywood.

Often sought as an ornamental tree in gardens and streets for their variety of exceptional features, their short 5m height, their thick blankets of white flowers which transform into stunning bright orange berries and the berries ability to attract large amounts of the bright rainbow lorikeets.

Also used as a plant for screening, what sets this plant apart from other screening plants is their unique diamond shaped leaves and the lush rainforest appeal.

It thrives in good well-draining soils and full sun.

Native to south east QLD.



Tie Bush (*Wikstroemia indica*)

Also known as Bushman's Bootlace.

The Tie bush has many natural properties such as strong fibers for weaving and string, as well as chemical pharmaceutical properties with cytotoxic activity (cell killing) used in commercial medicinal cures of diarrhea, inflammations, fungi and other microbials.

This plant can grow up to 1.5m and is a hardy grower in many soil types.

The fruits make it a suitable option as an understory bird attractant.

Native to South-east Asia and Australia in rocky hillside.

Koala Food-trees (*Eucalyptus*)

An assortment of tall, field-ready tubestock, including a mix of these species:

Dry- Wet-

E. exerta (Peppermint-scented gum) *E. Microcorys* (Tallowood)

E. melanophloia (Silver Leafed Ironbark) E. propinqua (Grey Gum)

E. moluccana (Gum-topped box) E. siderphloia (Northern Grey Ironbark)

E. crebra (Narrow Leaved Ironbark) E. tereticornis (Forest Red gum)

Corymbia intermedia (Pink Bloodwood)

News from Bio-Control

Our bugs and beetles are not fond of cold nights and whilst they remained quiet over the last couple of months, it gave Nina and Yvonne time to upgrade the biocontrol facility.

Our small shade house is fully secure with the intention of keeping roaming jewel beetles off their pending food plants. We're sure the little ones had a ball last summer, trashing two shade houses full of cats' claw creeper.

New plants have been potted and a fully secure shade house screen and clear patio door has been installed. Only time will tell if our hard work pays off.

Our leaf tying moth breeding cages have been relocated to their new 9 metre tent.

The new enclosure will help keep the moths secure when catching and transferring them to their new breeding cages. While they took their time going into pupation in May, generation 6 emerged on time.

An additional two more jewel beetle tents are up and running, giving us a total of 10 tents.

While we were aiming to release 100,000 jewel beetles by the end of January, the crazy weather patterns threw a spanner in the works.

Despite the weather, low humidity and drought conditions, we managed to release a little of 80,000 beetles and with 8 weeks still to go, you never know what could happen.

Another year has flown by and Christmas is just around the corner.

So, from all the bug ladies of biocontrol, we wish each and every one of you a very merry Christmas and an awesome 2020.

Our Bio-Control facility are offering a 75% subsidy to Gympie landholders for insects to control Cat's Claw Creeper and Madeira Vine!

Madeira Vine and Cat's Claw Creeper are an invasive species and have become an environmental weed smothering understory vegetation and killing mature trees.

Physical and chemical control is not always possible.

Biological controls form part of an integrated approach to pest management and are a cost-effective way to reduce the vigour of wide-spread infestations.

In the long term it is hoped that additional Bio-Control organisms will be found that will damage the tubers.

Containers for Change – Landcare is Now a Registered Depot

Gympie Landcare is now a registered depot for the Containers for Change Scheme.

As a state, we're great at many things. However, when it comes to recycling, Queensland can do a lot better. In fact, we have one of the lowest recycling rates in Australia, at around 44%.

Each year, approximately three billion beverage containers are generated in our state alone and are the second most littered item.

So, to help us all improve our recycling efforts and keep our beautiful environment litter-free, bring your containers down and start recycling today!

How Does It Work?

Bring in your recycled containers and pop them into the designated purple bins. All funds from the containers in the bins are donated to Gympie Landcare.

If you would like to claim your own change for the containers, you must use a multi-use bag and stick your label on the front.

Please note:
