

High Risk Species



What is a declared pest?

- Outlined in the Biosecurity Act 2014
- Classes include restricted or prohibited biosecurity matter
- Established in the State or new incursions; and
- Is causing, or has the potential to cause, an adverse economic, environmental or social impact.





General Biosecurity Obligation - GBO

Everyone has a *GBO* and must take all reasonable and practical measures to prevent or minimise a risk

In this case, land occupiers must take all reasonable steps to ensure an invasive plant or animal does not spread





Invasive Biosecurity Matter

Prohibited

- Generally not present in Queensland
- Reportable to Biosecurity Queensland within 24 hours

Restricted

- Found in Queensland, actions required to limit the impact of this restricted matter by landholders
- Must not sell, give away or release into the environment

Declared Pest Animals

- Already established and seriously threaten:
 - primary industries,
 - natural environment,
 - native wildlife, and
 - human and animal welfare.
- Must be managed by landowners on their property.
- Dependent on species, not be released/given, moved, kept or fed without a permit; penalties of up to \$44,000 apply.

Restricted Invasive animals

- Cat, other than a domestic cat (Felis catus)
- Dingo (Canis familiaris dingo)
- Dog, other than a domestic dog (Canis familiaris)
- European fox (Vulpes vulpes)
- European rabbit domestic and wild breeds (Oryctolagus cuniculus)
- Feral deer species chital (Axis axis); rusa (Cervus timorensis); fallow (Dama dama); red (Cervus elaphus); hog (Axis porcinus); sambar (Rusa unicolor).
- Feral pig (Sus scrofa)
- Goat, other than a domestic goat (Capra hircus)
- Red-eared slider turtle (Trachemys scripta elegans)
- Yellow crazy ant (Anoplolepis gracilipes)







Challenges - Pest animal management

- Pest animals are mobile
- Control methods can be costly/skilled
- Pest animals are often nocturnal/cryptic





What can be done?

- Exclusion fencing and other barriers
- Trapping
- Free Shooting
- Poisoning
- Management of Stock & Crops
- Management of carcasses





GRC & Pest Animal Management



- GRC manages pest animals on council land
- Provides advice and assists landholders
- Trap Loan Program
- Toxin 1080 Baiting Program (eligible landholders)




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


